'Amanda in Uganda'

International Health Case Study: My International Learning Opportunity Experience



'In 2006 I studied Tropical Nursing at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and since then I have had an interest in overseas development work in health.

Moving to Wales, I noted that there partnerships were strong countries in Africa. I applied for the International Learning Opportunities programme (ILO) in 2022 to utilise my skills in public health and infection control. The "new normal" is seeing emerging infectious disease threaten millions of people across the globe which are no longer restricted to any single country. Understanding the challenges in context are important in developing control measures.

I was matched with an organisation called Teams4U. The organisation has a successful Water and Sanitation Health Programme (WASH) providing health care facilities and district hospital with running water. The founder was in country when I arrived, and I accompanied the team in watching borehole drilling for water! It was a very exciting experience.

The ILO is for 8 weeks, so I designed a project utilising improvement methodology and agreed this with partners; the first 2 weeks were undertaking observations/assessments of IPC and discussing the challenges with staff. I became aware of an overuse of antibiotics and decided that this may be an opportunity to identify a baseline of prescribing antimicrobials in the district hospital.

Having met with the IPC committee in the district hospital, a prescribing point prevalence survey (PPS) was agreed. I received a wonderful "shower" of petals, as thanks for supporting their hospital. I registered the hospital with the Global PPS with the medical records admin. Results showed an overall prescribing rate of 71.2 % (48/66) which was high compared to the other regions. Six of seven new-borns were on antibiotics (85.7%). Broad spectrum antibiotics were mainly prescribed with a high use of cephalosporins (Ceftiaxone). All prescribing was empirical, guideline compliance was suboptimal and surgical prophylaxis was prolonged and against guidance in Uganda.

Developing these skills in leadership and coordination were invaluable, problems such as documentation and interpretation of the notes were solved in collaboration. Participating staff commented on how much they had learnt about antibiotic resistance and about the lack of indication for use.

Feedback was given at several forums, meant the Medical Superintendent and District Health Officer "now had the evidence" and an antimicrobial Stewardship Committee was established and met to take the recommendations forward.

I developed my skills and built new networks with international organisations including the Global PPS coordination centre, Commonwealth Pharmacists Association, international training teams in safe reprocessing of equipment.

My aim on return to the UK is to continue to support Teams4Uremotely and to return to Uganda in the future to undertake future projects and to check on my mango tree that I planted!'

WHO/Europe High-Level Forum on Health in the Well-Being Economy

The High-level Forum on 'Health in the Well-being Economy' held on 1-2 March 2023 at UN City in Copenhagen to discuss how we can create a Well-being Economy through putting well-being at the heart of public and business policies and investments. The Forum brought together high-level delegations from over 30 countries including from ministries of health, finance and economy, together with government advisors working on recovery, resilience and sustainable development policies, public health policy-makers, and representatives of national and international banks, nongovernmental organizations, the United Nations and European Union agencies. The Forum showed how countries are already shifting investment, spending and resources and inspired countries to unlock investments and create healthy, fairer and more prosperous societies for today and the next generation through a well-being economy approach.

The CPTPP trade deal is a major threat to public health and warrants a health impact assessment (HIA)

A new journal paper has been published in the BMJ with co-authors from the WHIASU team, which looks at the health implications of the UK's decision to join one of the world's largest free trade agreements, the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement on Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP). The paper recommends that the government should perform a health impact assessment (HIA) on the deal as one hasn't been carried out during the accession process.
