An updated <u>Toolkit</u> is now available to staff who are interested in international partnerships.

The implementation toolkit helps staff in Health Boards and NHS Trusts translate the <u>Charter for International Health Partnerships</u> in Wales into operational practices, ensuring that principles and values of the NHS are reflected in all international health activity. Implementing the Charter also aligns with the actions outlined in the Well-Being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015.

The toolkit has been developed and refreshed from lessons learned, compiling examples of best practice and providing a governance framework to support international health activity.

- Useful resources and much more.


As a living web-based resource, this toolkit will continue to be adapted.

Climate Change in Wales Health Impact Assessment (HIA)



Liz Green, HIA Programme Director, Public Health Wales, was invited to present and deliver a Q and A on the climate change HIA in Wales as part of a webinar series and masterclass session organised by the New Zealand NHS.

Participants included many from national, regional and local government (sustainable development units, climate change, health and environment leads) and the New Zealand National Health Service.

Feedback was hugely positive about the work and its impact to date and how it adds to a focus on wellbeing and vulnerability.

Call for Health Award Nominees

International call for nominations -John Dirks Canada Gairdner Global Health Award - scientifically based research that has improved the health and well-being of those facing health inequities worldwide.

The mission of the Gairdner Foundation is to celebrate, inform and inspire scientific excellence around the globe. The Gairdner Foundation was established in 1957 with the main goal of recognizing rewardina international excellence fundamental in research that impacts human health.

Professor Gagandeep Kang, Christian Medical College, Vellore, Southern India, won the 2024 award. Her work has made a significant impact on vaccine development and health policy in India and internationally.



Nominations for the 2025 awards are invited from any field of research impacting global health and health inequity.

The award is intended for research-focused candidates. Nominations are due by 11:59 pm PDT on October 1, 2024.

Recipients will be announced in March/April 2025, and presented in October of 2025.

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Comisiwn Bevan Commission

The Bevan Commission has published the findings of Phase One of <u>Conversation with the Public.</u>

In collaboration with NHS Wales Health Boards, Trusts and Llais, this piece of work engaged citizens across Wales in conversations about the future of health and social care services.

Through seven 'town hall' events in each NHS Wales Health Board locality, a national online event and a survey, the project successfully gathered the insights and views of over two thousand members of the public.

The Bevan Commission has also published a paper on the Values and Value of the Third Sector.

This paper explores the unique strengths and contributions of third sector organisations, highlighting their agility, resilience, and deep community connections. By developing greater collaboration with statutory services, the third sector can drive significant improvements in health and wellbeing across Wales.

30 Years of the Fairtrade Mark

Celebrate the Fairtrade Mark with a host of events in 2024. This radical poverty-busting icon turns thirty this year.

The Fairtrade Mark guarantees that a fair price was paid for the product at source; and that acceptable wages were afforded to all from crop to store.



End Poverty Now

Fairtrade was a movement in responding to the desperate plight of Mexican coffee farmers.

In the 1980s, the price of cocoa beans collapsed. Mega-corporations exploited a brief lull in the market by closing ranks.

It kept prices unsustainably low, driving into destitution many of those involved in the industry on the ground.

Fairtrade allowed consumers the choice to pay a little extra for their chocolate and coffee, in the knowledge that they weren't contributing to starvation price-fixing, human rights abuse and slave labour.

Farmers took the life-line, selling their best crops to those who paid the best price. The Fairtrade initiative grew from country to country and across the world.

Thirty Years On

In 1992, the Fairtrade Foundation was formed in Britain, part of the wider movement. It took a couple of years for products to appear.

Green & Black's flagship Maya Gold chocolate bar, made with cocoa beans from Belize, was the first to carry the legendary Fairtrade mark. It was swiftly joined by Clipper Tea and a choice of coffee brands - Percol and CafeDirect.

All stocked in British stores from September 1994.
