

Global Health Partnerships Cymru Conference (GHPC) 2025: Transforming Policy – Advocacy for Global Health Equality

'A timely gathering' and a 'powerful call to action', September's GHPC 2025 left delegates motivated, moved and impressed by a wealth of strong speakers, exhibitors and workshop leaders.

Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, Director-General of the World Health Organisation (WHO), opened with a video message centred upon the importance of connection, collaboration and collective action.

Over 130 public health professionals, policymakers, academics, and development practitioners from around the world heard his appreciation for vital partnerships like GHPC and its parent Hub Cymru Africa (HCA).

Welsh Government Affirms Support

Both partnerships were recipients of a Senedd endorsement delivered in person.

Sarah Murphy, Welsh Labour Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing, reaffirmed the support of Welsh Government for HCA and GHPC.

The Minster further spoke to the importance of global partnerships per se, highlighting success stories through the Wales and Africa programme.

The conference was funded by both Welsh and UK governments, organised jointly by GHPC and HCA, and hosted by Public Health Wales.



The **GHPC 2025 Conference** was a passionate call to action. Reiterating, as always, how collaboration remains at the heart of building a fairer, healthier global future.

Dr Sumina Azam, National Director of Policy and International Health, delivered the keynote address on Health Equity in a Globally Responsible Wales. Dr Azam reflected on how global issues contribute to inequalities within Wales; noting, "Wales has a lot to share with the world, and Wales can learn a lot from the world."

Israa Mohammed, Epidemiological Scientist (Advanced) in Health Protection at the Communicable Disease Surveillance Centre (CDSC), and GHCP's new Chair, was jubilant about the event. "This conference was a huge success, bringing together leaders from Wales and around the world for a day that was both innovative and deeply inspirational.

"It marked the first conference since the Wales and Africa Health Links Network evolved into Global Health Partnerships Cymru, an important milestone in our shared journey of partnership and solidarity.

"On behalf of GHPC, I want to extend our heartfelt thanks to the Hub Cymru Africa team, both staff and volunteers, for their outstanding support in organising and managing this event." Israa extended thanks to many others too.

Global Health Partnerships Cymru is part of the **Hub Cymru Africa** partnership board and supports 29 active health links - charities and organisations in Wales that work with partners in low- and middle-income countries, particularly across Africa.

Delegates heard powerful accounts from **Dr Ahmed Alshantti**, a Cardiff NHS doctor from Gaza, and **Professor Tom Potokar**, Trustee and Founder of Interburns. Both speakers offered poignant reflections on the collapse of health systems and attacks on healthcare workers in conflict zones.

Ben Simms, CEO of Global Health Partnerships, delivered an impactful talk on decolonising global health. Sessions on global citizenship, health equity, advocacy in Wales, and the role of diaspora health workers proved thought- provoking and energising, setting the stage for continued collective action.

The atmosphere was inspiring. The opportunities for networking and collaboration were invaluable. I also want to commend the excellent exhibitors. The energy in the room was palpable, and I hope we can build on this momentum to drive the strategy forward and support our partners."

British Society of Haematology (BSH) Collaboration with Colleagues in Zambia

This was the third visit by the British Haematology to support colleagues in Zambia. Our aim (4 medics, a nurse educator and a lab expert) was to improve care and management around blood disorders (Anaemia, Sickle Cell, Thalassaemia and Haemophilia) and promote safe blood transfusions across the capital's Lusaka's University Teaching Hospital and Ndola's Arthur Davidson Children's Hospital. Together, as health professionals, we were able to review many complex cases and lab films which made learning all the more bidirectional.

As the only nurse accompanying the BSH taskforce, my teaching expanded into the affiliated nursing schools. I was also requested to undertake some QA work to evaluate a training project between NHS England and the Zambian National Blood Transfusion Service aimed at hamovigilence to improve maternity services and promoting outcomes.

In summary, I engaged with 250 nurses (across the two sites). This included RNs working clinically, student nurses, and nurse educators. Early evaluations collated indicate that this BSH visit was a resounding success.

'Sarah' FGM/C Movie Trailer and Movement Tour Dates

A poignant and true coming of age movie, Sarah focuses on a young Maasai girl living in the beautiful Loita Hills of Kenya. Starring Namurru Sarara, it lays stark the reality of

female genital mutilation/circumcision and advocates against it.

The movie is primarily based on the real world experiences of **Sarah Tenoi**, who coproduced the movie. It captures the voices and stories of many other Maa women too.

Some appear on screen, as the completely amateur cast are all Maa, and perform their roles admirably.

Sarah is the first feature film created in the Kimaasai language (with English subtitles).

S.A.F.E. Kenya

Sarah Tenoi co-founded S.A.F.E. (Sponsored Arts for Education) Maa. It is part of the wider S.A.F.E. Kenya, which focuses on public health campaigns and education through the medium of Arts - tribal dance, plays and community workshops.

In recent years they have done a huge amount of work on changing beliefs and practices around FGM/C, and have recently produced a feature length film on this topic.

Rubella and Measles Gone from 21 Pacific Islands - Japan Latest to Eliminate

Limited resources did not derail a massive public health initiative in the Western Pacific. Collaboration was key to completion; and it was

truly impressive.

That determined multi-agency push just eliminated measles and rubella from twenty-one nation islands in the Pacific.

Ember Hilvers (Healthcare Epidemiological Scientist (Advanced), Public Health Wales) commented, "My first response was 'wow, well done!' followed by 'how did they maintain high uptake rates - especially after the vaccine mistrust that developed in the pandemic?"

She noted that while cost, geography, and transport pose challenges, "the hardest obstacle is changing attitudes at scale."





FIFA Global Health Education Animated Series Launch in Kyrgyz Republic and Tajikistan

The power of football is being used to promote health in a range of topics aimed at children. Eleven animated videos (in eight languages) were revealed at events in the Kyrgyz Republic and Tajikistan.



This forms part of a new initiative by the Fédération Internationale de Football Association (FIFA). The Health Education Animated Series hopes to reach youngsters globally, particularly from underprivileged areas. It 'aims to build healthier, more productive generations', as a 'global educational resource for families, coaches, schools and pupils.'

The three-day launch saw Bulgarian footballing legend **Hristo Stoichkov** sharing tips and posing for photographs. As ambassador for FIFA's Football for Schools, his presence underscored how those initiatives tied together.

After learning essential First Aid including CPR, each child received a 'Heart Hero Certificate'. They were encouraged put their new skills into practice as emergency response required. Over 300 children took home infographics in their own language explaining the importance of heart health.
